To Finish the Presidential Timeline:

Print out this page on a full sheet of 8½ x 11" sticky-backed label paper.

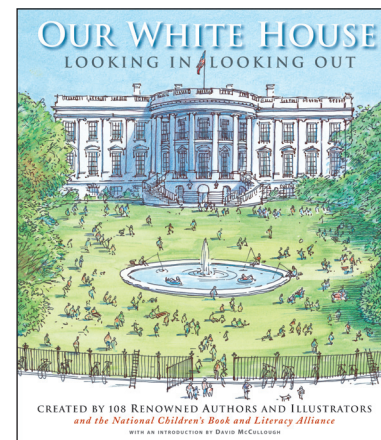
Cut along the dotted lines.

Remove the backing and affix the illustration of Barack Obama on page 225 of your copy of *Our White House* over the question mark on space number 44.

To Play the Presidential Trivia Game:

Read one of the facts at random from pages 226–227 in *Our White House* (be sure to skip over the president's name!).

Kids can use the clues featured on the game board on pages 224–225 to guess the answer.
