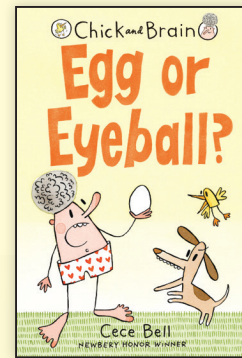




Chick and Brain Egg or Eyeball?

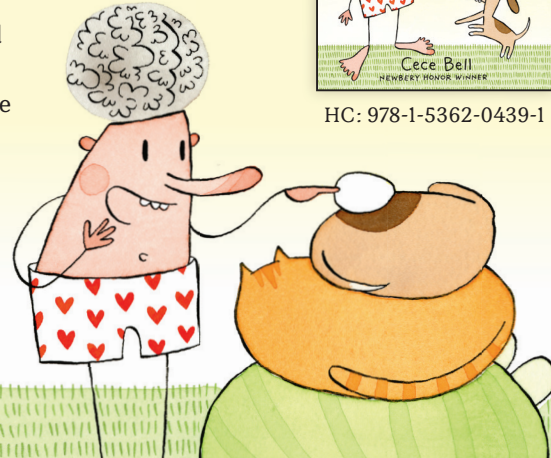

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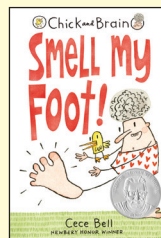

Use *Chick and Brain: Egg or Eyeball?* in your classroom to introduce elements of the graphic novel format and engage even your most reluctant readers.



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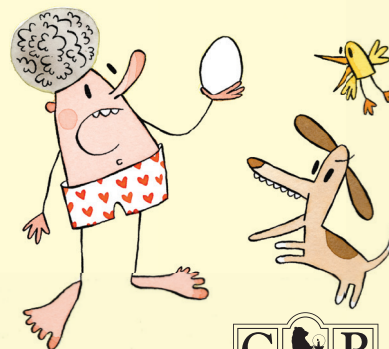
- If your students are unfamiliar with graphic novels, introduce the basic form that uses panels and speech bubbles. Then take a trip to the library to look at some other graphic novels, such as the first book in this series, *Chick and Brain: Smell My Foot!*



- Chick tries to get Brain and the other characters to use good manners. Discuss what manners are and why they are important.
- Talk about what makes the names Puff Huffman and Something Else particularly funny. Have your students come up with some silly names of their own and create a short graphic story.
